The Global Peace Foundation believes that, in addition to the unique and primary religious mission of each, the different faith traditions have a shared responsibility to bridge divisions, resolve conflicts and build ethical societies based on a common platform of universal aspirations, principles and values. In this way, the power of faith to inspire, guide and motivate can be actively engaged in vital peace-making and peace-building processes, for the benefit of the entire human family.


The unresolved division of the Korean peninsula is another conflict that threatens global security especially in Northeast Asia, a region with some of the world's most vibrant economies. Since 2011 GPF has advanced a nation-wide movement to build a consensus for the peaceful resolution of the division of North and South Korea, based upon time-honored values that all Koreans cherish. We call this vision and approach the "Korean Dream." This rapidly expanding effort engages top government officials and policy makers, NGO leaders, and a grassroots network of conscientious citizens in Korea and abroad who recognize the implications of a peaceful, unified Korea on sustainable peace in Northeast Asia and the world.

The Global Peace Foundation has also made great efforts to highlight and bring focus to the spiritual heritage in the Americas rooted in the Judeo-Christian traditions that values human dignity, rights, freedoms, and responsibilities, as granted by our Creator and not by any human institution. Given current challenges in the region, the Western Hemisphere is ripe for a spiritual great awakening that draws on that heritage to build just, ethical and prosperous societies. Such examples will stand as a beacon of hope for people everywhere.

For the past five years the Global Peace Foundation has worked extensively throughout the nation of Paraguay with multi-sector partners to address corruption and other fundamental social issues through education, democratization, development, and good governance. Today the Latin America region is rapidly developing and Paraguay has one of the fastest growing economies in the Western Hemisphere, opening a new era of regional and international cooperation and prosperity. A message from GPF's President

The year 2013 saw many significant advances in the work of the Global Peace Foundation, most notably in Africa. The continent as a whole is growing faster than any other region in the world with a \$2 trillion economy. Even more promising is the possibility of stability, peace and prosperity through the rise of constitutional democracies, a process that is engaging more and more Africans in actively shaping the futures of their nations and the continent as a whole.


Today the world is painfully aware of the ongoing grave threat in Nigeria posed by the radical insurgency movement Boko Haram. In 2013, following the declaration of a state of emergency for three states in northern Nigeria by President Goodluck Jonathan, GPF and partners convened Muslim and Christian leaders as well as traditional rulers in a national consultation, resulting in the launch of a nationwide initiative to build unity among Nigeria's peoples. The One Family under God campaign is working to leverage the moral authority of religious leaders and traditional rulers to mitigate conflict and rebuild trust, drawing on the history of amicable relations between Christians and Muslims in Nigeria.

GPF's Character and Creativity Initiative (CCI) also made significant advances in 2013, with major progress in Kenya and the launch of CCI in Malaysia, Nepal, Nigeria, Uganda, Paraguay, Brazil and Indonesia. CCT's approach engages teachers, parents and the local community in developing a school culture that promotes positive character development and creativity as central educational objectives.

GPF's All-Lights Village is pioneering a comprehensive approach to development in rural communities. It begins with bringing solar lamps to villages without electrification. But that is just the starting point for ongoing initiatives that promote the "light" of education, the empowerment of social entrepreneurial capacity-building, and an enduring commitment to community development.

In December 2013 more than 1,200 government, civil society and faith leaders from 40 nations gathered in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia for the Global Peace Convention, addressing the theme "Unity in Diversity: Building Social Cohesion for Sustainable Peace through Universal Aspirations, Principles and Values." Through such broad-based engagements and collaboration, GPF's vision of One Family under God is taking root and making impact around the world. Through dynamic multi-sector partnerships, our work is expanding and building momentum on every continent. Our plans for 2014 culminate in Asunción, Paraguay with the convening of the seventh Global Peace Convention in November. I look forward to welcoming you there.

The Global Peace Foundation is an international non-sectarian, non-partisan, nonprofit organization, which promotes an innovative, values-based approach to peacebuilding, guided by the vision of One Family under God. GPF engages and organizes a global network of public and private-sector partners who develop community, national and regional peace building models as the foundation for ethical and cohesive societies.

The Global Peace Foundation affirms the importance of universally recognized principles and shared values as essential to building social cohesion within nations and the global community.

Among these principles are:

- All people have intrinsic value, dignity and fundamental rights, as endowed by the Creator.

GPF Korea Receives Government Commendation for Charitable Work

Global Peace Foundation Korea was awarded a Certificate of Commendation from the Republic of Korea's Minister for Special Affairs Ko Heung-Kil on February 15, 2013.

GPF was recognized for its charitable activities over the last year, such as the All-Lights Village Project and the Power of 1,000 Won.

"The extent of social volunteer work is unprecedented for a civil society organization," Minister Ko said during the presentation. "It has made notable contributions to developing South Korea's national standing." He added that the government will continue to provide active support and cooperation for civil society organizations.

Global Peace Foundation Receives UN Commendation for Kenya Initiatives

The Global Peace Foundation was honored with a Certificate of Commendation from the United Nations Office in Kenya on October 24, 2013 for its "outstanding efforts to promote a culture of service among youth in Kenya."

The commendation cited GPF signature programs, including the Rift Valley Peace Initiative, which promotes peaceful coexistence among the different ethnic groups following the 2007/2008 post-election violence; GPF's Character and Creativity Initiative, which builds integrity and innovation among the high school youth; and the All-Lights Village Project, a community-based program to promote sustainable development and improve livelihoods.

GPF Malaysia Recognized with Peace and Unity Award

Global Peace Festival (GPF) Malaysia was honored by the government on June 29, 2013 as a leading NGO working to promote peace and unity in Malaysia.

GPF Malaysia's campaigns include Power of 10 Sen, a program to foster a culture of giving to help the less fortunate; Midnight Football, a project to guide and inspire at-risk youth to unleash their potential; Global Peace Volunteers, on-going community service programs for undergraduates; and International and Asian Youth Exchange, a platform for youth to accept and embrace diversity as a building block of peace.



Leadership Academy Mentoring Program Recognized with Promising Practices Award

The Global Peace Foundation was awarded the National Promising Practices Award at the Character Education Partnership Annual Conference in Washington, D.C. for its middle school mentoring program, Leadership Academy, on October 25, 2013.

The Atlanta-based program—run by the education arm of GPF—engages middle school and college students with competencies that develop their leadership, creativity and integrity.



GPF Nepal Leader Wins National Environment Award

Ms. Srijana Sitikhu, Program Officer of the Global Peace Foundation Nepal's Rivers of Peace Campaign, was awarded the National Environment Award for Youth on September 13, 2013 in recognition of her continuous contribution to environmental awareness programs, the Bagmati River clean-up campaign, and GPF Nepal's waste management-vermicomposting initiative.

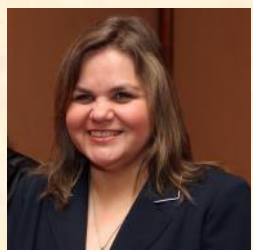

Social Cohesion and Peacebuilding



Nigerian Christian and Muslim leaders and traditional rulers met at a Consultative Meeting in Abuja to advance peace through an affirmation of shared values.



Identity-based conflict has its roots in limited, often adversarial conceptions of human community. In the twentieth century, identity-based divisions led to genocidal violence in Nazi Germany, the Balkan states and Rwanda, as well as grave human rights abuses in many other nations.

The Global Peace Foundation in its field activities in fifteen nations, in its educational initiatives, and in its regional and international conferences and conventions, affirms the common bonds and identity of all people, regardless of ethnicity, religion, and nationality, as members of One Family under God.

Muslim, Christian and Traditional Rulers Unite for Peace in Nigeria

African Statesmen Call for Multi-sector Collaboration for Peace and Development

A broad coalition of Nigerian Muslim and Christian leaders, traditional rulers, government representatives, and women and youth leaders proposed several practical measures for tackling the divisions facing their country at a Consultative Meeting in Abuja on May 16, 2013.

In the wake of recent violence and a declaration of a State of Emergency in three states by Nigerian President Goodluck Jonathan, the leaders offered support for GPF's initiative in Nigeria uplifting shared principles and values as a foundation for social cohesion.

At the November 2013 Global Peace Leadership Conference in Abuja, Muslim and Christian leaders and traditional rulers committed to advance the One Family under God campaign to mitigate sectarian violence and support national cohesion.

The nationwide campaign has received support from His Eminence, Alhaji Mohammad Abubakar Sa'ad III (Sultan of Sokoto); Pastor Ayo Oritsejafor (President, Christian Association of Nigeria), Her Excellency Hajiya Amina Namadi Sambo (Wife of the Vice President), His Eminence, Cardinal John Onaiyekan (Catholic Archbishop of Abuja). Campaign partners include the Nigeria Interfaith Action Association and the Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution.

Interfaith Alliance to Abolish Human Trafficking Hosts U.S. Capitol Hill Forum

Prominent leaders in the anti-trafficking movement told a forum at the U.S. Capitol that human trafficking is a modern form of slavery that is flourishing in the United States.

Panelists and invited faith leaders at the forum on November 21, 2013 emphasized the need for greater collaboration among government, civic organizations and the faith community in helping victims of trafficking.

GPF-USA's Safe Haven Campaign is an initiative to educate faith communities about human trafficking in the United States and provide informed and effective interventions when trafficking is suspected.

Muslim, Christian, Hindu Faith Leaders Emphasize Shared Values

Faith leaders representing Islam, Christianity and Hinduism at a forum in Washington, DC said that religious traditions are rooted in shared principles and values that are essential in promoting peace. Among the forum speakers, three Muslim women passionately affirmed that Islam upholds the value and dignity of women, and advances principles of justice, tolerance and peace.

The forum at the U.S. Capitol was co-hosted by GPF-USA and Nahdlatul Ulama, Indonesia's largest Muslim organization, on March 20, 2013.

GPF Indonesia Hosts International Multifaith Youth Assembly

The Global Peace Festival Indonesia Foundation hosted the annual Inter-

national Multifaith Youth Assembly in Makassar, bringing together over 100 youth from Indonesia, Malaysia, Cambodia, Afghanistan and Thailand.

The Assembly on September 25-28, 2013 focused on breaking down barriers among faiths and recognizing shared values.

Throughout four days, participants attended seminars, committed to a peace declaration, took part in a flash mob campaigning against violence and extremism, held interfaith prayers, volunteered their time and energy to service in the underprivileged area of Mariso, and visited places of worship to better understand and respect the diversity of faith traditions, including Hinduism, Christianity, Islam, Confucianism, and Buddhism.

"A painting is not beautiful when it is uniform and plain, but it is beautiful when it is colorful. We have to celebrate the differences we have among faiths," said Dr. H. Nasaruddin Umar, Indonesia's Vice Minister of Religious Affairs and the opening speaker at the Assembly.



Peace Building in Northeast Asia through Unification of the Korean Peninsula



The division of the Korean peninsula, a legacy of the Cold War, remains a grave humanitarian concern and destabilizing global flashpoint. The Global Peace Foundation has initiated a concerted, collaborative grass-roots effort, in conjunction with state and global support, to advance the process of reunification as the safest and most effective means to peace and prosperity for the Korean people and the world.

GPF is advancing strategies for unification in four key areas:

- A grass-roots movement to build awareness of the importance of unification, particularly among youth. GPF is lead organizer of Action for Korea United, a coalition of more than 400 NGOs advancing a vision of a unified Korea. Other initiatives in 2013 include a Unification writing contest for students and Unification Academy, a learning program in cooperation with the Han Sun Foundation and 16 Metropolitan offices of education.
- An Institute for Korean Peninsula Future Strategies, to be located in Washington, DC.
- Humanitarian projects in support of North Korean people, including bread factories and proposed All-Lights Villages.
- International engagement through forums for experts and policy makers. GPF Korea hosted four forums in 2013.

Global Peace Convention 2013 Hosts Leaders from 40 Nations in Kuala Lumpur

Assembly Advances Education, Entrepreneurship and Interfaith Initiatives to Meet the Challenges of Underdevelopment and Identity-based Conflict

More than 1,200 government, civil society and faith leaders from 40 nations addressed the need to advance social cohesion in diverse societies at the fifth Global Peace Convention in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia on December 5-8, 2013. The three-day convening, “Unity in Diversity: Building Social Cohesion for Sustainable Peace through Universal Aspirations, Principles and Values,” addressed areas of interfaith cooperation, education, community and economic development, family and youth empowerment, volunteer service, women in leadership, and business investment as a catalyst for peace.

The first to be hosted in a Muslim nation, the 2013 Convention drew upon Malaysia’s rich experience in melding a country from religiously and culturally diverse peoples.

Global Peace Foundation Chairman Dr. Hyun Jin Moon called for “soft-power” approaches,

Global Peace Leadership Conference



Global Peace Leadership Conferences (GPLC) are forums that address specific regional concerns and build consensus for political and community-based responses to poverty and conflict.

In 2013, the Global Peace Foundation hosted Christian, Muslim and traditional leaders to advance social cohesion in Nigeria (see page 12).

In the Philippines, the GPLC in November, “Moral and Innovative Leadership: A Platform for Sustainable Peace and Development,” convened just days after the devastating Super Typhoon Yolanda struck the archipelago. GPF diverted resources to host 10,000 volunteers to support clean-up in Manila Bay and provide solar lighting to families in affected regions.

specifically the establishment of a faith-based Peace Council at the United Nations, to meet the global challenge of identity-based conflict. “Today, religious identities are regional in scope and appeal, spreading far beyond national boundaries,” the GPF Chairman said.

Clerics and interfaith leaders focused on the significant role of faith leaders in addressing conflict and instability rooted in religious extremism. The Convention included a delegation of more than 70 Nigerians, and representative Muslim and Christian leaders spoke about their experience of friendship and cooperation in the West African nation which is gravely threatened by insurgent violence.

At a gala event, GPF conferred Global Peace Awards for Interfaith, Service, Good Governance, Family Strengthening and Scholarship. Malaysian Prime Minister Mohd Najib bin Abdul Razak was also recognized with the 2013 Global Peace Award for Promoting a Culture of Peace.

Moral and Innovative Leadership

*L*eadership in governance, business, the nonprofit sector, communities and families is among the most important factors in defining the direction and success of diverse human endeavors. The Global Peace Foundation advances programs that promote “moral and innovative leadership” to benefit not only local communities but the larger society, nation and ultimately the world.



More than ethics, which defines boundaries of personal conduct in public life, moral leadership is guided by a vision and informed by universal principles and values that have the breadth and depth to encompass the diversity of the human family.

Leaders with insights into the greater good also need practical, creative strategies to achieve substantial and sustainable results. Successful entrepreneurs and innovative leaders adapt to unexpected obstacles and utilize unforeseen opportunities.

Through leadership training, cross-cultural exchanges and service learning the Global Peace Foundation is committed to preparing leaders who have the character and creativity to adapt to a rapidly changing and increasingly integrated world.



International Young Leaders Assembly

Ten-Day Leadership Program in New York, Philadelphia and Washington, DC Highlights “Vision, Service, Entrepreneurship”



The International Young Leaders Assembly (IYLA) hosts university student leaders and young professionals from around the world for interactive programs at world-class institutions. Participants learn important leadership skills and collaborate on strategies for sustainable peace and development.

The second IYLA, “Moral and Innovative Leadership: Vision, Service and Entrepreneurship,” in the summer of 2013 drew 800 young leaders from over 70 countries for programs in New York, Philadelphia and Washington, DC.

The assembly was sponsored by the Global Peace Foundation, Global Peace Youth Corps, Global Young Leaders Academy, and Points of Light.

Participants in the 10-day program

attended a Leadership Assembly and embassy briefings at the United Nations Headquarters in New York.

The IYLA then hosted a program on America’s founding principles at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia. At the U.S. Capitol and the World Bank in Washington, DC, IYLA participants met and interacted with policy makers in areas of poverty reduction and entrepreneurship.

The IYLA included site visits of historic and cultural attractions, and concluded at the 50th anniversary celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.’s historic ‘I Have a Dream’ speech at the Lincoln Memorial.

Latin American Presidential Mission

Former Heads of State Collaborate to Advance Good Governance and Equitable Development in the Region

The Latin American Presidential Mission was officially launched by eight former presidents at the Global Peace Convention in Atlanta, USA, in November 2012. Some 20 former Heads of State from 12 Latin American countries are actively participating in this GPF initiative, which is also sponsored by the Paraguay Institute for the Development of Thought, the Esquipulas Foundation of Guatemala and the Uruguayan Leadership Conference.

In 2013, members of the Latin American Presidential Mission participated in major conferences in Paraguay (June), Uruguay (August) and Guatemala (September). Former presidents joined human rights experts, educators and business leaders in forums addressing the independence of the judiciary; threats to democratic institutions in Latin America; development opportunities through investments in science and the green economy; regional security; and youth culture in context of the battle with drug trafficking.

Fourteen former presidents also sent video messages which were presented at the fifth Global Peace Convention in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia in December 2013.

Africa Leadership Mission on Peacebuilding, Young Leadership and Service

An outcome of the 2013 Global Peace Leadership Conference in Abuja, Nigeria, the Africa Leadership Mission on Peacebuilding, Young Leadership and Service seeks to engage Africa's leading statesmen and corporate leaders in efforts to moderate conflict, provide opportunity through youth service, and meet the continent's most pressing development challenges.

The GPF-backed project includes five former heads of state—Zambia's founding President Kenneth Kaunda, Seychelles founding President Sir James Mancham, former Nigerian President Olusegun Obasanjo, former Ethiopian President Girma Wolde-Giorgis, and former Zanzibar President Amani Karume—African philanthropist Dr. Manu Chandaria, and Dr. Markendey Rai, Global Parliamentary Chair of United Nations Habitat, Kenya.


Another outcome was the establishment of the Africa Peace Service Corps to advance youth service through projects in environment, health, peacebuilding and entrepreneurship.

Empowering Families





The importance of strong families as a foundation for peace and social cohesion has been recognized throughout history among all cultures. The family is the primary environment where children mature in character and heart through the affirmation and guidance of mothers and fathers.

The Global Peace Foundation supports youth through building coalitions that strengthen families, through GPF's signature Character and Creativity education initiative, and through community and international service to foster responsibility and respect for others as members of one human family.

Character and Creativity Initiative

Globally, some 300 million youth are unemployed or underemployed, a crisis that has led to growing conflict, political instability and income inequality. Employers cite lack of appropriate skills, and education systems that fail to prepare youth for the demands of the twenty-first century job market.

The Global Peace Foundation's Character and Creativity Initiative (CCI) seeks to make education more relevant by transforming classroom and school culture, empowering teachers and principals to educate the "complete child" rather than focusing exclusively on grade point average and test scores.

Through CCI training, youth are not only better equipped for the modern workplace but also develop character competencies to contribute to peaceful societies through building stable families and supporting communities as good citizens.

From the initial pilot project in Kenya, CCI has now been launched in Kenya, Nigeria, Uganda, Paraguay, Brazil, Malaysia, Nepal, Indonesia, Mongolia and the Philippines.

A global precedent in education

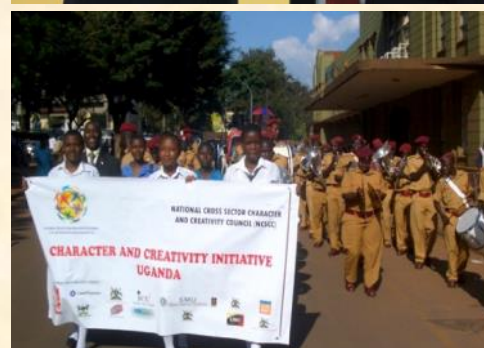
On Jan 3, 2013, Kenya's Ministry of Education set a global precedent when it announced new guidelines for teachers and schools to be ranked based on their contribution in molding a "total child" through helping students cultivate their talents, enhance good character and foster creativity.

This decision follows a groundbreaking report released on August 13 by the Kenya Institute for Public Policy Research and Analysis (KIPPRA) which found that nurturing character and creativity not only improves academic performance and school culture but also reduces social problems such as violence, bullying and substance abuse in the schools. KIPPRA is a public research institute that advises the Kenyan government on the achievement of national development goals.

Global Peace Volunteers



Global Peace Volunteers is an undergraduate program to foster a culture of selflessness and volunteerism and an environment of acceptance that transcends religion, race and nationality. The program in Malaysia, Indonesia and Nepal cultivates qualities of character that contribute to the enhancement of families and communities, and equips future leaders with the skills and vision necessary to inspire positive change.

Global Poomashi

Global *Poomashi*, a Korean word meaning "exchange of work," advances the vision of One Family under God by sending Korean students to other countries to work with local youths, develop respect for other cultures, and come to value each person as a member of the same human family. The project has sent Korean young professionals to Kenya, Nepal, Mongolia and the Philippines.

Two thousand young leaders from every region in Kenya participated in the National Youth Summit 2013 in Nairobi on January 31–February 1, 2013, pledging support for the summit theme, “Our Country, Our Responsibility.”

The peace and leadership development summit was convened by Brand Kenya Board in collaboration with the Intergovernmental Authority on Development, Global Peace Foundation, Uwiano Platform for Peace and twelve other youth service organizations.

Summit objectives included offering a platform for a youth leadership agenda in Kenya, promoting awareness of youth support programs, and advancing peace, reconciliation and civic duty among Kenya’s diverse ethnic groups.

A Volunteer Experience

Global Peace Youth supports service learning through many GPF initiatives. Volunteer Jessica Kang traveled between Korea and the Philippines 16 times as a GPF participant for the All-Lights Village Project and has also worked for Global Poomashi projects to promote international friendships among Koreans and Filipinos. Jessica talks about her experience here.

THERE IS A SAYING “WHEN IN ROME, DO AS THE ROMANS DO.” I was in the Philippines, so I had to follow their ways. In the beginning, I was only concerned about seeing progress in our work. But I shifted my focus to getting to know the people. Now, I am almost a Filipina!

My first experience in Sultan Kudarat, South Mindanao for sure was the most memorable. Everything was new, and everything that could have gone wrong, went wrong. But it left the most profound and vivid memory. I have to say it was also the most rewarding.

The rebels in Mindanao Island were involved in armed conflict for independence from the Philippines. Once in a while we heard news about foreigners being kidnapped, which totally frightened me. Less visited by foreigners means less developed. But I wanted to supply solar-powered lanterns to the villagers so they could live a better life. So, despite the danger, I left for Mindanao Island without thinking twice.

It takes an hour by plane from Manila and several hours by bus driving along a dirt road that stretches over the mountains to get to Sultan Kudarat. We stopped by a small grocery on our way, and the owner recognized us as GPF volunteers and wanted to shake hands with us.



The owner said to us, “As a Filipino citizen, I am so grateful for you coming all the way here to help us develop.” Then, I realized although what we do is quite challenging, it is certainly rewarding.

I am not doing this for myself but for the advancement of Filipinos and friendship of two countries. But we have a long way to go. There are 34,000 Filipino villages that are spending dark nights without power. We just covered 9 of them.

After having worked for a year, I realized “Truth can make the impossible possible.” Filipinos speak a different language, have different skin color and culture, and everything else is different, but we approached them with a truthful heart. That is when they opened their hearts to us. My heart will always remain sincere and I am fully committed to this work.



Models of Development



The Global Peace Foundation has initiated projects to advance peace, strengthen families, foster interfaith understanding and collaboration, and promote a culture of service. With support of partners from government, business, the faith community and the nonprofit sector, these initiatives are models where innovative new approaches can be tested and scaled to address persistent problems of social conflict and underdevelopment.



All-Lights Village Project

Community-based Development



Global Peace Foundation's All-Lights Village Project is a community development program bringing light and hope to rural villages with limited access to electrical power. The project combines solar technology with clean water solutions, education, income generation and public-private partnerships to improve the overall quality of life in measurable ways.

From its initial launch in a remote region of the Philippines by GPF Korea in May 2012, the project has expanded to Mongolia, Malaysia, Kenya, Indonesia and

Nepal with support from GPF Japan and GPF USA.

An evaluation of the program in Mutate Village in Rift Valley, Kenya in July 2013, a year after distribution of lamps to 100 families, found that the lamps had a measurable impact in areas of health, education, security, economic livelihood and community cohesion.

Without electricity, villagers were forced to use expensive kerosene lamps that emit poisonous gases in their homes, causing asthma and other air-borne diseases. The project has also promoted community cohesion and reconciliation as the households with lamps share them with others from differing ethnic backgrounds. Mutate Village has also become safer as house and street lamps have helped to curb theft and other illegal activities.

“Solar lanterns helped improve students’ literacy. For the first time our school produced six students with over 300 marks in their Certificate of Primary Education exams while there was only one last year.”

The All-Lights Village Project benefits from the collaboration of key stakeholders, including NGOs, governments, faith-based organizations and corporations.

GPF Japan established an All-Lights Village in Paseban in the mountainous region of Mega Mendung, Indonesia in January 2013 to provide solar lanterns to families.



Global Peace Business Council

Private sector business has a critical, under-recognized role in poverty reduction, sustainable development, and regional peace and stability, particularly in emerging markets. The Global Peace Business Council is committed to engaging the power of the private sector to empower and develop human capacity and resources in order to address these development challenges.

The Council welcomes business leaders as well as distinguished political, NGO, academic and media leaders throughout the world who understand the connection of commerce to peace and stability and the value of entrepreneurship in overcoming poverty.

Global Peace Business Forums convened in Malaysia and Nigeria provided a global platform for business leaders to promote peace and development through trade and investment opportunities.

Major corporate support of GPF projects include funding and in-kind donations for All-Lights Village and Action for Korea United in Korea; Character and Creativity education in the Philippines and Kenya; and conflict resolution initiatives in Nigeria and Kenya.



GPF Kenya patron Dr. Manu Chandaria, CEO of Comcraft Group, an enterprise that spans over 40 nations, has been a leader in utilizing business, trade and investment as a catalyst for peace. In 2013 Dr. Chandaria donated 1 million Kenyan shillings to the Mary Leakey Girls Secondary School in Nairobi to establish a Leadership and Entrepreneurship (LEAP) Hub at the school.

Global Exchange, Community Change

Community Development and International Service Learning in Brazil

Brazil is one of the fastest-growing major economies in the world, yet significant socioeconomic divides remain. The Global Exchange, Community Change Program in Goiânia, the capital and largest city of the Brazilian state of Goiás, is bringing residents, local partners and international volunteers together to transform a neglected community in the city.

Launched in December 2013 with volunteers from Peru, Uruguay, Panama, Costa Rica, Egypt and China, the model program will build up community vegetable gardens and parks, host community festivals to raise money, offer English classes at the community center and conduct door-to-door education on recycling and waste management.

GPF's Character and Creativity Initiative was also introduced in the Joaquim Câmara Filho school in August 2013, emphasizing a transformation of school culture and the importance of good character, entrepreneurship and other essential soft skills.



Environmental Conservation



The Global Peace Foundation supports environmental conservation and sustainability through numerous projects that also build local capacity and encourage entrepreneurship.

Through programs like the Rivers of Peace Campaign, water resources are being restored in Nepal, Kenya, Indonesia, Malaysia and the Philippines.

GPF Kenya's Adopt-a-Tree initiative engages students in planting and caring for seedlings to counter the threat of deforestation. GPF Nepal's Vermicomposting Program converts solid waste into nutrients for soil. The compost can be sold, providing women a way to generate income.

In the Nairobi settlement of Kariobangi, GPF Kenya hosted programs to improve health, sanitation and the environment, including a partner-supported "community cooker" recycling project that converts garbage into fuel for cooking.

With the assistance of international and local volunteers, Community Farms and Gardens in Brazil, the Philippines and Paraguay support impoverished communities with essential nutrition.

Clean Cookstove Project

Global Peace Women Launches Signature Project in Uganda and Nepal

According to the U.S. National Institutes of Health, indoor air pollution from fireplaces almost exclusively impacts the world's poorest communities, killing some four million people per year—mostly women and children.

In early 2013, Global Peace Women with support from the Global Peace Foundation began the implementation of a clean cookstove project with Ugandan women in the villages in several districts.

The cookstoves create airtight cooking chambers that prevent smoke from escaping around cooking pots. Simultaneously, a tin chimney provides an exhaust channel for the dangerous fumes that would otherwise fill the kitchen. The project has now expanded to Kenya and Nepal.

Improving Livelihoods and Social Cohesion in Muslim Communities in Mindanao

For decades, residents of Mindanao in the Philippines have endured poverty, conflict and political instability.

The Global Peace Foundation Philippines Alternative Learning System program, GlobALS, in partnership with the Department of Education, assists out-of-school children, youths and adults to achieve their goals, improve the quality of their lives and become effective contributors to society.

Earlier this year, six rural Muslim communities in Davao Del Norte working with GPF Philippines came up with rice-lending systems, goat-farming and a sari-sari cooperative store to address their most pressing needs. These programs are now contributing to the economic livelihoods and community awareness of their members.

GPF Philippines also teaches Arabic Language and Islamic Values Education (ALS-ALIVE) designed for Muslim migrants to encourage positive contributions to peace efforts of the Philippine government in Mindanao.

GPF Philippines supports Muslim residents of Mindanao with economic cooperatives and alternative education programs.
